By all accounts, the 1st Annual Symposium on HIV, Law and Human Rights was a phenomenal success, surpassing our expectations by the number of people in attendance, the media coverage and the high calibre of panel members. Highlights included the public lecture on "The Criminalization of HIV Transmission" by Justice Edwin Cameron from the Constitutional Court of South Africa. The Legal Network has played a leadership role in pushing for legislation to streamline

“Canada’s Access to Medicines Regime” (CAMR), the law intended to help developing countries procure lower-cost, generic medicines through the effective use of compulsory licensing.
